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1/What is the Edu-Skate Worldwide Network?

The Edu-Skate Programme

Edu-Skate is more than just a guide on how to teach skateboarding lessons: it is a sports-based education programme that utilizes skateboarding to empower youth aged 6 - 16. The programme aims to stimulate personal development through the fun of skateboarding: besides teaching the basics of skateboarding, it means to empower the children that partake in the programme, arm them with the tools necessary to achieve their goals and let them flourish in order to be agents of change in their lives and communities instead of victims of their circumstances.



The skateboard as a platform to develop yourself

The Edu-Skate programme is grounded in the belief that you can learn and practice skills through skateboarding that are not just important in skateboarding, but also in your development as a person in life: life-skills.

Examples of these life-skills are believing in yourself (confidence), establishing a supportive environment (encouragement) and getting back up after you fall down (resilience).

By focusing on these transcending skills, skateboarding can serve as a complementary or alternative platform for youth socialization (especially for youth experiencing an insufficiently stimulating or neglectful upbringing). Edu-Skate aims to pinpoint, highlight and convey the value of these life-skills through skateboarding lessons and sessions.

3 cornerstones of skateboarding are identified around which the life-skills programme is organized:


Competence: becoming skillful in something, being effective in what you do. Unlike many other physical activities, skateboarding is constantly focused on trying, learning and mastering new skills.

Relatedness: a feeling of belonging and connection to others. Even though it's an individual activity, "skateboarding is a social activity and skateparks are centers(/places) of community building" (Ian Borden). You skate together with friends or people you don't know: you share skatable spaces, which causes it's inclusive character. And more importantly, skateboarding has been a place where people that don't feel like they belong anywhere else find connection. This is likely related to point 3:



Autonomy: making your own choices. This is the most important characteristic skateboarding distinguishes itself with: the freedom it brings to do what you want and to express yourself.

This foundation of the programme finds its support in the Self-Determination Theory, which identifies the 3 mentioned cornerstones as the 3 basic psychological needs people need to satisfy for psychological well-being and to be able to thrive. Not only does the extensive body of research on this theory show its utility in a number of different life-domains (such as education, work and physical activity), but furthermore, research suggests that these basic psychological needs are universal to humans rather than depending on the culture you grow up in.

The Network

Although the programme has been in development for 5 years, 2022 marked the first year of the Edu-Skate Worldwide Network: an international network between social skate organizations around the programme's life-skills focused approach to teaching skateboarding.

- Enriching the work of social skateboarding projects.
- Connecting different social skateboarding projects around the world.
- Developing a structure for practice sharing between social skateboarding projects on how to execute sessions with a life-skill focus and providing quality skate sessions.
- Further developing the quality of the Edu-Skate
 Programme & developing an easy to use format for (social) skateboarding organizations.
- Facilitating output and reports for organizations to find funding for their work.
- Securing a grant with the output of the collective efforts of the Edu-Skate Worldwide Network of 2022 and split this grant between participating organizations to support the continuation of their activities in 2023.

Skateboard Club Vienna (SCV)

Skateboard Club Vienna (SCV) is a non-profit association for the promotion of skateboarding with a focus on youth, culture and diversity. On many different levels, the association sees itself as an input provider, mediator and initiator for the skateboarding scene and culture in Vienna. The aim is to make skateboarding accessible to everybody and to have positive influence on the participatory development of public space, the leisure activities of the city of Vienna and open and social interaction through sports.

Implementation plan

The curriculum was used in SCV's "On Board"-programme for primary schools. The programme consists of 8 organized skate sessions that are held in 4 skatepark locations close to their partnering schools. Schools can choose if they want to have 8 consecutive sessions for one group of students or 4 sessions for 2 groups of students. There is also the possibility to use the school's gyms with bad weather.

Ran **32 sessions** between April and December over 2 lesson series.

8 skate coaches of Skateboard Club Vienna delivered the Edu-Skate programme, with 2 coaches present per session.


Participants were engaged by offering the programme to 2 schools. Little promotion work was executed as there were enough kids at the schools that wanted to skate.

90 children engaged with the programme.

- Age range: between 6 12 years old, with an average age of 9.
- 56% girls, 44% boys.

402 attendances in total.

- 56% girls (226) and 44% boys (176)
- Average session attendance: 13 students

Funding

Project funding for Edu-Skate in Vienna came from a governmental initiative for extracurricular school activities of the Austrian sports ministry called "Kinder Gesund Bewegen", which is dedicated to enable school-association-partnerships. "Kinder Gesund Bewegen" consists of various sport-related sessions that are being held with children aged 6-10 years.

In total **€6,500** was obtained to implement the programme.

The award winners* in this category have one thing in common: With their initiatives, they want to motivate people to exercise more and break down barriers. The winning project "ON BOARD" of the Skateboard Club Vienna, for example, tries to strengthen social and personal skills via the skateboard. "We use the skateboard as a tool in children's and youth work to teach life skills," explains project manager Johannes Wimmeder. In a playful, sporty way, participants* are taught self-confidence, stamina and creativity, as well as mindfulness, respect, teamwork and cooperative learning in four to eight weeks. Learning to board up to overcoming ramps should help to integrate experiences into everyday life and to talk openly about difficulties and successes. Participation is free of charge and is tailored to the respective target group.

Free Movement Skateboarding (FMS)

"Through skateboarding, we support the wellbeing, empowerment and social cohesion of youth in Athens. Our mobile skatepark gives us access to diverse spaces. From public parks to shelters for kids in care and unaccompanied young refugees, we bring together people of different ages, genders and social, economic and cultural backgrounds through skateboarding. We discuss themes like teamwork, identity and persistence, going beyond skateboarding with some of the most socially marginalized youth in Athens."

In their 5 years of operations they have:

- Delivered 700+ sessions in 18 locations
- --- Worked with 2500+ youth from 59 nationalities
- Of which are 40% girls and women

Implementation plan

Free Movement Skateboarding implemented the Edu-Skate programme on a monthly or slightly more frequent basis at a location where they bring obstacles to organize the sessions. These sessions take place at this location on a weekly basis and are open to access for registered participants, which means participants differ from session to session. With the high rotation in participants, they aimed to reach more children with the programme by offering it on a less-frequent-than-weekly basis, reaching both regular attendees as well as new beginners each session.

Ran **10 sessions** between July and December over 1 lesson series.

The following life-skill lessons were implemented in these sessions:

- → A Positive Mental Attitude
- \longrightarrow Awareness
- → Confidence
- \longrightarrow Respect

7 skate coaches of Free Movement Skateboarding delivered the Edu-Skate programme, with 5 coaches present per session.


FMS has been running these sessions consistently over a long period of time, causing awareness of their activities in the community. No additional engagement strategies have been implemented for the Edu-Skate classes.

106 children engaged with the programme.

- Age range between 7 12 years old.
- 21% girls, 79% boys.

283 attendances in total.

- 36% girls (101) and 64% boys (182)
- -Average session attendance: 28 students


The Edu-Skate implementation took place in the framework of already existing sessions, so no extra funds were allocated. FMS calculates approximately €80 to execute a session.

In total **€800** was spent on implementation of the programme.



Skate Nottingham

Skate Nottingham is a non-profit place-making, sports development and alternative education organisation rooted in Nottingham's globally significant skateboarding community. They use skateboarding as a tool to unlock learning and creativity, with an aim to raise the profile of skateboarding as a positive, healthy and creative activity that contributes to Nottingham's social, cultural and economic development.

Implementation plan

Skate Nottingham (SN) implemented the Edu-Skate curriculum in free-of-charge outreach sessions they deliver in a sport center in a disadvantaged inner city neighborhood (St Ann's - one of the most economically deprived in the UK). Besides these outreach sessions, SN organised a skate camp in August for young people in St Ann's eligible for Free School Meals, providing another opportunity for more intensive Edu-Skate delivery.

Two team members have prior career experience in education (a primary school teacher and university lecturer) and SN has robust safeguarding policies and processes. All coaches and volunteers have clean Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) certificates and child safeguarding training.

Ran **17 sessions** between July and November over 1 lesson series and 1 summer camp.

12 skate coaches of Skate Nottingham delivered the Edu-Skate programme, with 4 coaches present per session.





Funding



Project funding for Edu-Skate in Nottingham came from a Sports England grant.

In total **£6,000** was obtained to implement the programme.

"Our biggest takeaways from Edu-Skate were the importance of structure - and how this improved the program's ability to engage young people who may not be interested in skateboarding (e.g. the prompt in the Edu Skate handbook to include whole group games, which are great for re-engaging less engaged participants) and the introduction and continued reinforcement of life skills = which has helped Skate Nottingham's positioning re: partners in the wider youth development and social working sectors (expanding our networks beyond 'sports'). Our delivery of the program was instrumental in us being offered formal youth work training by the city's main youth service provider Base 51. Narrowing it down to just one 1 think we'd say the biggest would be the engagement of young people who would previously become disinterested in the sessions when they were purely focused on skateboarding."

Free skateboarding lessons in Nottingham

Young people in Nottingham will soon be able to participate in free weeky skateboarding lessons.

Local social enterprise Skate Nottingham announce that they are partnering with international charity. Concrete jungle Foundation (ICF) to become the first organisation in the UK to deliver CJP's 'Edu-Skate' programme, joining a network of skateboarding non-profits in France, the Netherlands, Austria, forecea, Jamaia, Morocco and Peru.





QF have developed Edu-Skate, a positive youth development programme that teaches 11 life-skills within skateboarding sessions.

Edu-Skate has already reached more than 1,000 children in 6 different countries.

This follows Skate Nottingham's recent receipt of a grant from Sport England and the National Lottery's Queen's Platinum Jubice programme, to deliver free sessions in Inner-city Nottingham along with training for coaches that included five places on Skateboard GBs 'Get Rolling' coaching course.

Since the end of March, Staze Notingham have been delivering these essions at the Benefond Lavernet Sports Series, 52: Arris's of ar engaging a total of 51 juming people aged between 7 and 14. Sessions have grown from 15 participants in the first week, to 27 Jb Wroek 8. Stain or other Ethnic Minority background, and almost half of participants are stifs.

The sessions enabled by Sport England funding will provide the perfect environment to deliver Edu-Skate.

The sessions take place every Saturday, at 10.30am until 12.00pm and are totally freedf-tharge, including free Sateboard and Heimet Kaan, with qualified coaches (including DBS and child sategurarding training). From 18³ June commark, the sessions will move to the small skatepark at King Edward Park, Sheniton. Anyone aged 7 and above is welcome to join in, with updates on venue location and pre-booking for equipment loan via Satex Nottingham's social media.

Chris Lawton, Skate Nottingham co-founder and Community Development Officer at Skateboard GB said:

"A grant from the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Award has enabled us to give young people a great introduction to skateboarding for free, whilst enabling Skate Nottingham to learn from international best practice.

"We're blown away by the amazing progress of the young people, both in their skateboarding and their wider development and we can't wait to start delivering lifeskills with the avesome partners of the Edu-Skate Worldwide Network."

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6/ Partner: CJF Peru

CJF Peru

Peru is the first location where Concrete Jungle Foundation rolled out the Edu-Skate programme. For 5 years, the programme has been implemented and developed at several locations in the "La Libertad" region. CJF Peru has been a completely locally run organization since 2021, reaching children in some of the most disadvantaged neighbourhoods of the area with recreational and educational activities through skateboarding.

Implementation plan

In 2022 CJF Peru implemented the Edu-Skate programme at 4 different locations:

- At 'La Rampa', a skatepark in a community center in the marginalized community of Cerrito de la Virgen. This skatepark is the home of CJF Peru.
- At a concrete football court in the neighbourhood of 'Buenos Aires'. The team noticed a number of children in this area without any constructive activities and started providing outreach sessions on the count on a weekly basis.
- The 'Santa Edelmira' Skatepark, a DIY skatepark in the middle of Trujillo without any provision of youth activities.
- The 'Oyelena' skatepark, a skatepark built by CJF Peru in 2022 near Cusco in Peru for the youth-based NGO 'Oyelena'. CJF Peru supported the implementation of the programme after the skatepark was built.

Ran **221 sessions** between January and December over 4 lesson series.


Sessions have been promoted mostly mouth-to-mouth and creating awareness in the communities and partnering with NGO's like a children's home.

Funding

Project funding for Edu-Skate in Peru came from Concrete Jungle Foundation. As funding covers the additional activities and projects CJF Peru runs as well, the funds for only the Edu-Skate programme are an estimation based on the total budget.

In total **\$20,000** was obtained to implement the programme.







Special achievement

CJF Peru supported the NGO Oyelena in running a skateboard project for the first time through the Edu-Skate programme.

Furthermore, the Edu-Skate Programme attracted Canadian TV station 'TV5 Monde' to visit Peru and shoot an episode for their documentary series "Skate le monde" about the work of CJF Peru.

Finally, CJF Peru was invited to the 'Congreso Internacional de Surf Regenerativo' to bring social organizations together to share about their work, organized by 'Waves for Development. CJF Peru shared their pedagogical approach to skateboarding through the Edu-Skate programme with the organizations here to inspire the work of the other organizations.

CJF Peru also left inspired by the work of the other organizations, resulting in new projects planned for implementation in 2023.

Freedom Skatepark Jamaica

The Freedom Skatepark in Jamaica became a reality in 2020 by a network of partners, including Concrete Jungle Foundation for the execution of the construction and youth programmes at the park. Since then, the park has served the existing skateboarding community, the youth from the surrounding community and Jamaica in general as the first street-style skatepark in Jamaica and the only skatepark in the Kingston region. The park's operations have been fully managed by the local staff since 2022 with the support and guidance of Freedom Skatepark Foundation.


The local staff implemented the Edu-Skate programme this year by partnering with youth-based organizations and institutions, like Rise - Life Management Services and L.i.f.e. Academy. Groups from these organizations visit the park on specific moments in the week for Edu-Skate classes. Youth from the surrounding community are free to join as well.


Participants were engaged by partnering with youth organisations who selected participants to join the weekly classes. Classes were also announced for the wider public on social media, and mouth-to-mouth in the community surrounding the park.

127 children engaged with the programme.

In total **\$15,000** was obtained to implement the programme.



"My biggest take away from the Edu-Skate programme is the opportunities. Not just my own opportunities that I've earned, but the opportunities that everyone has received. Opportunities such as little kids that want to come and learn something brand new. It makes me feel really good, that someone can put an opportunity, and the opportunity is a seed, in the middle of your palm. And you have to water it, you have to figure out how to make it grow, you have to figure out how to turn it into a palm tree. Implementation plan

Location: Tamesloht, Morocco

The local staff implemented the Edu-Skate programme exclusively for the children from the center: they all have an Edu-Skate lesson and open skate session integrated in their weekly schedule at the center.

Ran **90 sessions** between April and December over 2 lesson series.

The following life-skill lessons (all) were implemented in these sessions:

- → A Positive Mental Attitude
- → Awareness
- \longrightarrow Confidence
- → Respect
- → Cooperative Learning
- \longrightarrow Resilience
- → Perseverance
- → Encouragement
- → Courage
- \rightarrow Creativity
- → Teamwork

9 skate coaches of CJF Morocco delivered the Edu-Skate programme, with 2 coaches present per session.

Participant engagement


Participants were engaged through the center, no further promotion has taken place.

44 children engaged with the programme.

- Age range between 6 18 years old, with an average age of 14.
- 27% female, 73% male

798 attendances in total.


- 30% girls (237) and 70% boys (561)

Funding



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Project funding for Edu-Skate at the Fiers et Forts Skatepark came from The Skateroom. As funding covers the additional activities and projects the Freedom Skatepark runs as well, the funds for only the Edu-Skate programme are an estimation based on the total budget.

In total **\$6,000** was obtained to implement the programme.



"My biggest take away is that when kids understand the life skill of the day, are explaining/teaching/applying it with other kids. It means that they see the value of it and that they want to share it. So basically, teaching things that kids will also teach in the future to the others."

9/ Project: Student Exchange Letters

One of the projects that came forward from the partners of the network this year, was to not only use the network to connect social skate projects from different countries, but also as a way to enable a connection between the students of the different partners.

The intention of many of the partners with this global citizen initiative was to provide an opportunity for their students to understand the wider world and to be open and engaging positively with other identities and cultures with 1 common denominator: following the Edu-Skate programme.

The project took off in November and took shape in the format of 'Edu-Skate Profiles'.

In <u>phase 1</u> of the project, students filled in the profile template and customized it to make the profiles best represent them and the place they live.

4 partners participated in phase 1 of the exchange: Skate Nottingham, All Boards Family, Freedom Skatepark Foundation & CJF Morocco

40 students filled out an Edu-Skate Profile.

In <u>phase 2</u> of the project, students will get the chance to respond to each other's profiles (and get a response to their profile) through a template response letter.
